	A social justice model of assessment
	Description
	Assessment and feedback in tertiary education is neither value neutral nor culture free: within its procedures, structures and systems it codifies cultural, disciplinary and individual norms, values and knowledge hierarchies. This leads to inequities in the learner experience and often results in disparities in outcomes. In short, assessment and feedback in its traditional form can be inherently unjust.
	In this workshop, we will explore the ways in which assessment can embed inequity, and a potential alternative approach. Focusing on assessment at point of design, and drawing on the theories of universal design for learning and culturally sustaining pedagogy, the workshop will support delegates to design assessment that is "socially just", enabling all students to meet their potential.
