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Becoming a Critical Educator Tuesday 9 July

The LTA are establishing a Critical Education Network, to be launched following Dr Stephen Brookfield's 'Becoming a Critical Educator' session on 9th July as detailed above. The purpose of the network will be to support and enable a critical exploration of the public, political and wider societal dimensions of pedagogic practice and research. Initial activities will be focused around a programme of seminars, events and networking opportunities. While the Critical Education Network will be coordinated through the LTA it is open to anyone within and beyond the university who is interested in participating. LTA Scholarship Fund

The Learning and Teaching Academy awards a small number of scholarships each year to enable university staff to undertake relevant education-related scholarship and research. Staff Development Fund

The Staff Development Fund supports colleagues undertaking formal continuous professional development and accredited learning opportunities. A small review panel meets regularly to consider applications submitted via Staff Development Officers in Academic Partner colleges or Executive Office line managers. So far, in 2018/19 the fund has supported 44 applications including eight applications for Level 12 studies; 19 applications for Masters Programmes and 11 Post Graduate programmes of study.

AdvanceHE Aurora Leadership Development Programme 2018/19 Evaluation

An initial Evaluation Report on the 2018/19 AdvanceHE Aurora Leadership Development Programme has been written by Ann Tilbury. The findings highlight the huge value of the programme for participants with the most highly valued aspects reported as the development days; the opportunity to build both internal and external networks and the provision of a mentor through the University Mentoring Scheme. The majority of participants have reported that the programme had encouraged them to proactively manage their career, take more responsibility within the university and to seek out leadership roles.

University Graduate Attributes: new downloadable resources

Examples of using the graduate attributes are being collated and shared through the LTA. These examples demonstrate the many ways in which the graduate attributes can be used to support the learning experience. Two recent examples of embedding graduate attributes are Project RED where Gamekeeping and Wildlife Management students have the opportunity to work with disabled war veterans and the Curriculum Development and Employer Engagement Team's collaboration with the Scottish Institute of Enterprise (SIE) on accreditation of modules and workshops through the Scottish Innovative Student Award (SISA) programme.

Online dementia training praised by visiting Professor Eun-Hi Kong

Last month the EDU team were delighted to welcome Professor Eun-Hi Kong of Gachon University, South Korea, following the launch of a digitally-enhanced dementia education programme for nursing students. The Dementia Enhanced Practice to Promote Excellence (DEEPE) curriculum was initially designed and introduced at UHI by Dr Leah Macaden, in 2017. For the past year, Liz Hudson and her EDU sub-team, Daniel Falconer and Angus

MacDonald, have been working with Dr Macaden to design an online learning companion for the programme.

The new collection of interactive workbooks scaffold interactive materials, including a 360° simulation, across the informed, skilled and enhanced levels of the new NHS Education for Scotland/Scottish Social Services Council's Promoting Excellence Framework. Professor Kong was particularly impressed by the innovative application of learning technologies and motivational pedagogies to support self-directed learning.
